


LOCATION

Address: Maliebaanstation 16, 3581 XW Utrecht




- By train: A shuttle train departing from platform 2 of Utrecht CS will take you directly to station Maliebaan. (More information)

On the Impact of (Research on) Financial Stress

Prof. Dr. Wilco van Dijk Social, Economic and Organizational Psychology Knowledge Centre Psychology and Economic Behavior Leiden University

Across the Netherlands, the cost of living increased sharply during 2022. Energy (+114%), petrol (+18%) and food (+11%) all contributed to a high inflation. Consequently, many Dutch households experience financial stress as they struggle to make ends meet.

Financial stress is a psychological state evoked by a perceived threat (i.e., shortage of money) combined with the appraised inability to adequately deal with the threat (i.e., lack of control over one's financial situation). Financial stress causes depression and anxiety, impedes cognitive function, and instigates avoidance behaviour. It impacts relationships with others negatively, resulting in experienced stigma and social exclusion. And it affects work performance, indicated by absenteeism and reduced productivity and commitment.

I present our research on the causes and consequences of financial stress, and address possible ways to reduce it or counteract its negative consequences. Moreover, I talk about how we use our work on financial stress to create societal impact. In the Knowledge Centre Psychology and Economic Behaviour, we apply our insights to design behavioural interventions, share our knowledge with practitioners and policy makers, and support programs that aim to reduce financial stress and promote financial well-being.

A Motivational Perspective on Exhaustion (and Recovery)

Prof. Dr. Alexandra Freund Developmental Psychology University of Zurich

Exhaustion is often conceptualized as having spent limited resources (such as cognitive, motivational, or emotional energy) that can be recovered by waiting until the batteries have been recharged (e.g., by relaxing). In contrast to this approach assuming energy resources that are depleted through use, I propose a motivational model of exhaustion that takes a functional perspective. More specifically, I hypothesis that exhaustion signals that a given activity does not contribute to goal achievement in a way that justifies further engagement, as effort could be better invested into the pursuit of an alternative goal. Thus, the model assumes an ongoing implicit cost-benefit analysis balancing the investment into the ongoing activity and its instrumentality visa-vis the value of the intended outcome.

Another important tenet of the motivational model of exhaustion is that subjective expectations about how exhausting an activity is, serve on the one hand as a standard of comparison whether the investment into the ongoing activity is in the expected range. On the other hand, an activity that is expected to be exhausting is hypothesized to lead people to monitor their experiences and selectively attend to signs of exhaustion. In contrast, when pursuing an activity expected to lead to recovery, people are expected to preferentially process signs of recovery. The selective attention to signs of exhaustion (or recovery), in turn, might lead to experiencing more exhaustion (or recovery). In this talk, I will present the motivational model of exhaustion (and recovery) and empirical studies testing a number of its predictions.
